
Special Commission for the Investigation of Massacres and Disappearance of Migrants



The Committee on Enforced Disappearances of the United Nations (UN) took up again and supported the recommendation of Fundación para la Justicia regarding the need to create a Special Commission for the Investigation of Massacres and Disappearance of Migrants, in order to collaborate in the investigations on human rights violations and crimes, such as extraiudicial executions, massacres, disappearances and torture of migrant people.

of five massacres of migrants, and has confirmed and verified the lack of technical capabilities and willingness of the Mexican government to bring justice to these cases.

And in the cases of missing migrants, it is even more complex to compel the authorities to search and investigate, since the families of these people are not in the country where the events took place.



The Fiscalía General de la República (FGR) (National Attorney General's Office) does not have either the structure or the capabilities that allow it to investigate these cases. On the contrary, it has some bad practices, such as:

- **Dividing and fragmenting the information.**
- Lack of autonomy?
- Little or no collaboration whatsoever among countries, institutions and the people involved in the investigation.
- In addition, the department that usually takes on these cases, the Fiscalia Especializada en materia de delicuencia organizada (FEMDO) (Specialized Attorney's Office on Organized Crime) of the FGR, tends to criminalize victims, defending people, experts and journalists.3

The Committee on Enforced Disappearances of the UN visited Mexico on November of 2021, verified and lamented that there still exists the generalized situation of disappearances in most of the Mexican territory:

- It pointed out that migrant people are particularly vulnerable regarding the issue of disappearances.
- The underlying causes of the disappearances have not been addressed properly, and the fight against impunity is pressing.
- It considered necessary the creation of a special multidisciplinary commission for the investigation of disappearances and massacres against migrants.

What is a Special Commission and what would it do?



It must include expert people of renowned experience and expertise, international organisms, non-profit organizations, universities and groups of victims.

t must have technical autonomy in order to bring forth the causes of violence and systemic impunity in **Mexico**, ensuring:

- The right of non-repetition of events.
- **■** The support to investigations aimed to fight impunity.
- The creation or strengthening of new methodologies to investigate complex international cases that involve grave violations to human rights.
- The fulfillment of works, recommendations and conclusions that could be taken into consideration by the FGR.

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The importance of special commissions:



- Special commissions have been used in the region as extraordinary measures to investigate cases of serious violations to human rights in order to clear up the facts and ensure the right of the victims to the truth, justice and reparations in certain contexts of violence.
- Thanks to the impactful work of Fundación para la Justicia and the committees of families of murdered and missing migrants, in 2021 the FGR, through the Attorney's Office of Human Rights, expressed the interest to receive technical assistance from the UN for the investigations of massacres of migrant people, which represented a significant step in the configuration of this mechanism.
- Once this Special Commission is formed in Mexico. Central American countries can be able to join this initiative, since it is required an international collaboration in order to investigate the criminal networks that operate in several countries.
